Year 6

Writing - composition

Pupils should be taught to:

plan their writing by:

- identifying the audience for and purpose of the writing, selecting the appropriate form and using other similar writing as models for their own
- noting and developing initial ideas, drawing on reading and research where necessary
- in writing narratives, considering how authors have developed characters and settings in what pupils have read, listened to or seen performed

draft and write by:

- selecting appropriate grammar and vocabulary, understanding how such choices can change and enhance meaning in narratives, describing settings, characters and atmosphere and integrating dialogue to convey character and advance the action précising longer passages
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evaluate and edit by:

- assessing the effectiveness of their own and others' writing
- proposing changes to vocabulary, grammar and punctuation to enhance effects and clarify meaning ensuring the consistent and correct use of tense throughout a piece of writing
- ensuring correct subject and verb agreement when using singular and plural, distinguishing between the language of speech and writing and choosing the appropriate register editing stations
- proofread for spelling and punctuation errors
- perform their own compositions

Writing - vocabulary, grammar and punctuation

Pupils should be taught to: (Y6 focus)

develop their understanding of the concepts set out in English appendix 2 by:

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- using relative clauses beginning with who, which, where, when, whose, that or with an implied (ie omitted) relative pronoun
- learning the grammar for year 6 in English appendix 2

indicate grammatical and other features by:

- using commas to clarify meaning or avoid ambiguity in writing
- using commas to indicate parenthesis
- using semicolons, colons to mark boundaries between independent clauses
- using a colon to introduce a list punctuating bullet points consistently
- use and understand the grammatical terminology in <u>English appendix 2</u> accurately and appropriately in discussing their writing and reading
